Statement on Artificial Intelligence

We believe these AI tools will be part of our everyday lives – therefore we need to adapt and transform our educational programmes and assessment practices so our students can use them ethically and effectively



Artificial Intelligence

Current IB Policy

- If students use text or images from an Artificial Intelligence (AI) (such as ChatGPT) they must:
 - Put the text in quotation marks,
 - make clear it is from AI, and
 - include details (including the prompt) in the bibliography
- Is all about transparency – students being clear what is their thinking and what they have found from other sources.

Some Facts

These threats to assessment are not new

Plenty of websites “deconstruct” Theory of Knowledge titles far beyond what a responsible teacher would do.

“Ghost writing” services have long existed:

- Internet

- Personal tutors

- Friends and family



Using AI Detectors

- Competition between detection and generating software
- Detection of AI generated work is not the same as plagiarism detection

Be mindful of how you approach the issue with students
Failure to cite it = plagiarism



The Shortcomings of AI

- Emphasise the dangers of bias being built into AI models
- AI learns from a body of work. If that body is biased or incomplete....
- AI can produce wrong information
- AI can empower those who are good thinkers but poor writers – paradigm shift



In Conclusion

If a student understands everything they have submitted, they can discuss and explain it, and they have been ethical and transparent in how they have used the ideas of others then.....
